


We also offer support to the youth of Victoria to achieve their educational goals.

Governance

Freemasons Foundation Victoria (FFV) manages two registered charities - The Freemasons Public Charitable Foundation (FPCF) and Freemasons Benevolent Fund (FBF).

The Board of FFV, in its role as Trustee for these two charities, is committed to high standards of corporate governance and implementing policies and procedures which reflect these standards.

To maintain these high standards of corporate governance the Board:

- > properly identifies, discloses, and manages any conflicts of interest;
- > acts honestly, in good faith and in the best interest of FPCF or FBF;
- > uses care and diligence in fulfilling their functions; and
- > does not take improper advantage of their position.

FFV Members are senior Freemasons, and include the Freemasons Victoria Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master and Immediate Past Grand Master. The role of Members is to appoint Directors for a specific term. There must be five directors who are Freemasons before a non-Freemason director may be elected.

Our programs are designed to be able to fund a diverse range of programs and initiatives and to benefit current and future generations.


It is thanks to our generous donors that FFV is able to continue to deliver this support and celebrate the impacts of our grants and partnerships.

If you appreciate the work of FFV, you can make a contribution to either of our Funds. This year, we partnered with Safewill to make it easy and affordable for anyone to write their Will online.

Masonic Grants

FFV's Masonic Grants program assists Victorian Craft Lodges, Mark Lodges and Chapters to amplify their philanthropic activities in the local community. It is open for applications 11 months of the year, from 1 July.

On average, Lodges have increased their charitable giving four-fold because of this program.



Community Support

FFV Masonic Grants

This is the cornerstone of our philanthropic giving. Whenever possible, approved Masonic Orders will be supported to extend their charitable works with local community not-for-profit organisations that are aligned with our focus areas.

FFV Community Grants

Through this program, ACNC registered charities can apply directly to FFV to support a specific project or part of a project, program or initiatives in our funding areas.

Major Impact Grants

Designed to contribute to substantial projects in Victoria, FFV makes one-off grants, usually distributed over multiple years that help make a significant impact in one of our chosen focus areas.

Disaster Relief Fund

Established in January 2020, this fund supports recovery, reconstruction and prevention projects for communities impacted by disasters.

Benevolence

The provision of financial relief to current members of Freemasons Victoria and their dependants or spouse who are in financial need or require other support which cannot be provided by Government or other agencies.



Each financial year, the Grand Master of United Grand Lodge of Victoria may nominate charities of his choice that he wishes to support. This can be supported to a maximum of \$25,000, subject to the charities meeting FFV's eligibility guidelines and the Chairman of FFV agreeing to the request.

FFV Education Support

Since 1912, Freemasons have been awarding Victorian Masonic Scholarships. The aim of the programs is to aid the youth of Victoria in achieving their education goals.

FFV Lodge Education

Supporting Victorian Craft Lodges with their local community scholarships, bursaries and awards for primary, secondary and tertiary students.

FFV Scholarships

Available annually to secondary students and first year tertiary students, scholarship applications are assessed on the student's results, financial need or difficulties and school and community activities.

FFV Tertiary Support Scholarships

Providing support to tertiary students undertaking their first tertiary course who require financial assistance with their studies.

Higher Education Scholarships

Partnering with Victorian Tertiary Institutions, FFV funds several scholarship places at major institutions. These scholarships are managed by the Tertiary provider and granted annually.

Sixty years of food relief, from plum puddings to pandemic grocery vouchers

Freemasons Community Relief has a history of delivering food parcels in the community that goes back 60 years. At Christmas time in 1963, Lodge St Leonard distributed 50 parcels to Freemasons and community members who had fallen on hard times. They were joined by Lodge Cerberus in 1974. The invitation to become involved was extended to all Masonic Lodges meeting in the Sandringham Temple in 1977 and by the 1980s, they were delivering more than 150 parcels a year across the Bayside area, and 250 by the mid-80s. Back then, it was known as Bayside Masonic Lodges Christmas Parcels.



The name changed to Freemasons Community Relief (FCR) in 2019, as the need for support continued to grow in the community. Grant Chapple, Freemasons Community Relief Secretary, said what started out as Christmas parcels full of food and plum puddings, grew to include a mid-year drop in the last five or six years, and shot up further still when COVID hit.

"With the pandemic, it became difficult to deliver hampers to the charities we support. So, in 2021 the committee investigated sending grocery vouchers for distribution to the needy. This has proved quite successful and enabled us to continue our support even when the food supply chain has faltered due to shortages.

"When we are able to do hampers, FCR supplies green and yellow bags filled with different food and beverage items to be distributed to each needy person or family," Mr. Chapple explained.

FCR used to hand deliver the parcels but this is now done through 16 charity groups from St Kilda to Hastings. They also support Freemasons and their families who are in need and each year ask Lodges to advise the committee if they believe any of their members need support.

Even with the pandemic largely in the past, in light of cost of living increases, the need for support hasn't abated. Bayside Lodges fundraise for the parcels and Masonic Grants provide additional funding so they can reach as many people as possible.

"Getting donations to the value that we want to provide through our charity is no easy feat. The Freemasons Foundation has made life a lot easier for us - they've been a godsend."

"Without the Freemasons Foundation and Masonic Lodges support our group would have ceased to exist!"

Ready to roll at Colac RDA

Colac Riding for the Disabled club has a dozen clients who visit weekly to enjoy the wheelchair horse carriage, pony riding or the mechanical horse, otherwise known as an equicizer. It's a significant event for participants with severe disabilities, requiring numerous volunteers to ensure safety.

They faced a challenge with wheelchair access to the horse carriage area. The solution was roll-up mats for grassy terrain, but funding was needed. Jim Prigg and Brendan Scanlon worked on a grant application with assistance from FFV, resulting in a grant to purchase the mats.

This simple project significantly improved safety and access for wheelchair users, allowing them to reach the horse carriage area in all seasons, and the volunteers are very pleased with the outcome. "That's the great thing about what the Foundation does - it doesn't have to be bigger than Ben Hur," Jim said.

Joyce Hoycroft, Colac RDA Secretary, thanked the Freemasons for supporting their cause.

"Both our clients, as well as volunteers, will benefit from easier and safer access to the horse drawn carriage area. With some clients either being wheelchair dependent, or experiencing some mobility impairment, suitable access enables participation. Their participation to drive a horse drawn carriage delivers a strong sense of achievement within our equine program."

When local Freemasons visited to see the project in person, they were struck with its importance. Jim Prigg said that it's clear the activity brings young people so much joy.

"For many of the Colac RDA clients, the weekly trip to what this wonderful group of volunteers provide is their major outing. To see the looks of gratitude and enjoyment on their faces was truly worthwhile and inspiring."

As Jim remarked, "If this is what makes Freemasonry such a wonderful organisation with the support of the Foundation, then I will continue to look for opportunities in my local community to support such organisations and groups. Thank you to Neil Cripps and the Freemasons Foundation Victoria."

Veteran health research supported in memoriam

Colonel Sir Ernest Edward 'Wearv' Dunlop AC. CMG, OBE was an Australian surgeon renowned for his leadership while being held prisoner by the Japanese during World War II. He restored morale in the prison camps and jungle hospitals. He devoted himself to the health and welfare of former prisoners-of-war, and their families, and worked to promote better relations between Australia and Asia. In addition to being a courageous leader and compassionate doctor, he was a Freemason.

In 1985, the Weary Dunlop Medical Research Foundation was established to encourage medical researchers to study the health conditions of Veterans, serving personnel and their families.

Since Sir Edward passed away, an annual memorial has been conducted, traditionally on his birthday, the 12 July. This July marked the 30th Anniversary of these events.

Lodge Liberation No.674 has attended these Memorials for several years and built a valuable relationship with the members of the Weary



Dunlop Medical Research Foundation, their other supporters and researchers.

This year's moving ceremony was conducted in the Sanctuary of the Shrine of Remembrance and led by President of the Weary Dunlop Medical Research Foundation, Robert Winther OAM. It was attended by more than a 100 Distinguished Guests and representatives of ex-POW Associations. The Ode was recited by Diana Dunlop, granddaughter of Weary Dunlop.

Freemasons Neil Nyholm and Ron Ferdinands presented the Weary Dunlop Medical Research Foundation with the proceeds of their fundraising for the year, which when added to a Masonic Grant, totalled \$12,420. The Weary Dunlop Medical Research Foundation used this donation to award a grant to Dr Monica Langiu's research to identify biomarkers associated with synaptic learning for the early diagnosis of Alzheimer's Disease - a type of cognitive/memory impairment that heavily affects veterans.

Through the work of young Victorian medical researchers, Weary Dunlop's legacy lives on.

Supporting students to re-engage and find success in South Portland

At a house on the hill in South Portland, a satellite campus of Portland Secondary School caters for students who have disengaged from mainstream education.

For children who have left school after major challenges including trauma, mental health issues, anxiety and neurodivergence, the Portland Secondary College Re-Engagement Program improves their chances of success in life. Teachers at the program foster strong and supportive relationships and assist students to make a positive contribution to their community by transitioning to further education, training, or employment.

The program opened in 2011, with 26 students. Since then, they have educated more than 200 young people. Many have completed their education and moved into employment or apprenticeships.

The FLO (flexible learning options) school has a junior and a senior class running three hours each day. There's a heavy focus on hands on or applied learning, and improving literacy and numeracy skills.

For the past seven years, Portland Lodge and FFV have supported the Portland Secondary College Re-Engagement program with grants for IT, furniture and class facilities, health and wellbeing activities, excursions and camps. In 2022, a \$5,000 donation enabled students to learn about Indigenous issues and culture in the area. The students visited the local Budj Bim World Heritage Area and Tower Hill in Warrnambool and planted an Indigenous garden at the back of the campus. Working with local tour guide Brayden Saunders, the students learned about meeting places, trading, smoking trees for cooking eels and seasonal food gathering.

Lauren Logan, Campus Manager, one of two staff provided by Portland Secondary College, said the students were incredibly engaged with these excursions, always asking when the next one would be held.

"Connection to Gunditimara Country, which is where we are, has really improved for our students now. And that connection to community is really important for wellbeing, as well as the educational side of it."

In 2023, a further \$5,000 grant funded the purchase of table settings for an outdoor classroom and ceiling fans to keep the indoor temperature comfortable, which is important for some of the kids with sensory processing issues. It also helped fund the school camp and other health and wellbeing activities.

The students appreciate these donations - they even cooked up a bacon, egg and sausage breakfast for local Freemasons to thank them for this year's grant.

"The local Freemasons came out to Budj Bim with us one day, so it was nice to see them interacting with the students and the students speaking with another generation."

"The FFV funding provides opportunities that the students wouldn't otherwise get - things they get to experience, being able to improve their confidence and self esteem, and getting out and interacting. The more they do and achieve, the more they can stand up with their heads held high and feel like they can achieve."

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Sub-Fund Grants

Named Sub-Funds allow FFV to preserve a donation or bequest to provide gifts to chosen charities or cause areas in years to come. The initial investment is grown via donations and pooled fund investment returns and granting can begin once the balance reaches \$11,000 (from an initial donation of \$2,000 or more).


This year's Sub-Funds granted a total of \$51,150 to benefit local students and support causes close to the hearts of Lodge members and donors.

- > Kerang Lodge Sub-Fund granted \$7,000 to Kerang District Health to fund a Nursing Scholarship.






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FFV Scholarships

This year, FFV awarded Scholarships totalling \$281,900 to 105 students. These awards included secondary scholarships of \$600 or \$1,500; \$5,000 tertiary scholarships; and one \$10,000 tertiary scholarship. Additionally, six recipients of multi-year scholarships from previous years continued to receive support.

Our Scholarship Presentation evenings held in May presented a wonderful opportunity to host young Victorians from across the state to award them with their scholarships and celebrate their futures. Some recipients travelled from as far as Bendigo and Ballarat to gather at Freemasons Victoria in East Melbourne.

For many students, the cost of education can be a significant barrier to achieving their dreams. However, these scholarships are not just financial aid but are also a symbol of recognition for the hard work and determination of these young people.

FFV Tertiary Support Scholarships

Tertiary education is an expensive endeavour, yet our Tertiary Support program is undersubscribed. Tertiary students who need financial support to complete their studies can apply to the FFV Tertiary Support program. In FY 2022-23 only one of these scholarships was awarded, valued at \$1,000.

Lodge Education

Many Lodges run local scholarship and awards programs that benefit students who are deserving of support because of either academic achievement or financial need.

It was another strong year for FFV's Lodge Education Support program. In 2022-23 Lodges accessed FFV support to deliver \$79,440 towards the education of Victoria's youth through masonic scholarship and awards programs.

Lodges themselves contributed \$35,420 to these programs. In total over 230 scholarships were awarded through Lodge Education programs.



Aiming for pitch perfect service at NextSense



Freemasons have been supporting NextSense (formerly Taralye) for more than 20 years. Today, the registered NDIS provider works with children, adults, and their families, supporting them through diagnostics, assessments, early intervention, and education.

In 2023, a Community Grant from FFV allowed NextSense to expand its Cochlear Implant (CI) services in Victoria. This program supports recipients of all ages, from pre-surgery assessments to lifelong mapping services. Early implantation in children significantly improves their language and communication skills, while for adults with

significant hearing loss, CI can reduce the risk of dementia.

With the grant, NextSense acquired an Audiometer and two Real Ear Measurement (REM) machines, enabling them to offer CI suitability assessments, rehabilitation, and mapping services at their Blackburn and Moonee Ponds sites. This one-stop approach minimises the need for patients to travel extensively for care.

"This ensures consistency and continuity of care that will involve our audiologists, ENT specialists, early intervention therapists, speech pathologists and occupational therapists forming a multi-disciplinary team of support around the children and their families."

Furthermore, Canterbury Lodge, Clifton Hill Lodge, Lodge of Concentration, Malvern Waverley Mark Lodge, Melbourne Shrine Club and United Press Lodge all combined with FFV to contribute over \$7,800 to support various initiatives at NextSense, including a mobile farm and magician for playgroup celebrations, equipment and fauna for the Blackburn clinic's aquarium, personalised teddy bears for children receiving Cochlear implants, professional development for staff, and grounds upkeep for their Blackburn property. These efforts ensure NextSense can maintain its vital services for the community.



Leaving no gap in education costs: Chelsea Community Support Service

Being ready to attend school in warm, comfortable, quality clothing with the appropriate text books and supplies provides a greater sense of belonging and builds self-esteem for children, enabling them to better engage with their education and the opportunities on offer.

In 2020, Chelsea Community Support Services Inc. (ChelCSS) launched the Fair Start School Support Program to help families in the City of Kingston. This program, funded by pandemic response grants, supports vulnerable families who often face financial hardships. It provides school uniforms, textbooks, and other school necessities to children from various schools.

Families seeking education support are generally already linked with ChelCSS for other services, often come from single parent or grandparent households and are on fixed incomes or government payments.

When faced with school related costs at the end of the year and trying to make it through Christmas, programs like this can relieve the financial pressure and mental burden.

In 2023, a \$5,000 grant from FFV supported 28 families and 50 children, covering uniform costs and educational expenses, even helping early school leavers attend TAFE.

ChelCSS works in partnership with State School Relief who provide vouchers that cover 50-60% of the retail cost of uniform items, with the FFV grant covering the gap.

This year, they were proud to be able to help a 17-year-old who wanted to return to school. Providing a laptop meant Lucian, pictured, could return to study and complete Year 11 and 12, so he could enrol in TAFE. His single mother was experiencing financial hardship and could either pay for fees or buy the laptop – but not both.

"My son and I both were made to feel relaxed and comfortable and it was an easy conversation to have with the Support Worker to ask for Education Support Assistance. To have such an amazing program that supports youth and their education is truly helpful. It also took away the extra financial stress of purchasing a laptop which assisted my wellbeing. I thank Chelsea Community Support and all the awesomeness that they offer to support persons, families, and youth in need."

Chelsea Community Support Services continues to be a lifeline for families and youth in need, providing essential support and opportunities. Community Support / Education



Connecting Communities through Music:Community SupportMelbourne Symphony Orchestra's Regional Touring Program

Music has the power to positively impact community health and wellbeing and the MSO believes that all Victorians should have access to these benefits, regardless of geographic location. Thanks to the ongoing support of FFV, the MSO continues to bring enriching and meaningful musical experiences to communities across the State.

Support from FFV enabled thousands of people in regional communities to access cultural opportunities through mainstage gala concerts, school concerts and a program of wrap-around learning and engagement opportunities. In early 2023 alone, a program of school performances and workshops took place in Wangaratta and Shepparton, in addition to a side-by-side rehearsal with the Goulburn Valley Orchestra; a Classic Kids concert for schools in Bendigo; and a gala concert with pre-concert talk in Ballarat, featuring internationally in-demand and highly celebrated Australian conductor Jessica Cottis.

The unique opportunity to work side-by-side with MSO's world class musicians can be transformative for local orchestras.

Goulburn Valley Orchestra's Music Librarian and Percussionist, Wade, states: "The rehearsal with MSO was one of the best I have been to. Every person learned something from the whole experience, and it was just a brilliant rehearsal. I left there on an absolute cloud nine."

Orchestra Cellist, Emma, said: "I thoroughly enjoyed the rehearsal we had alongside members of the MSO, with Aaron Wyatt as conductor. Both Aaron and the members of the MSO were warm, encouraging and their presence was an inspiration. I felt that I had a much better understanding of the cello part and how it fit alongside the other parts of the orchestra and our playing as an ensemble was lifted to a new level. I am very grateful for the generosity of the MSO for their attendance at their rehearsal, the experience was invaluable."

Supporting sporting clubs with healthy values inside and out

SALT (Sport and Life Training) has been working with Victorian sporting clubs for eight years to foster mental resilience and healthy values in their teams and broader community. They received a Community Grant to deliver their Wellbeing and Mental Health module to sporting clubs. This initiative, called the Clubs with Heart webinar series, engaged nine clubs, including the City of Melbourne Bowls Club, the Warrandyte Netball Club, and others.

The program focuses on creating clubs and team environments that cater to both competitive and personal development needs. More than 100 clubs have participated in the series. The funding allowed SALT to offer Masters Football Clubs the Club Wellbeing Package, including interactive mental health sessions at clubrooms with a unique Live Quiz platform so people can give anonymous real-time feedback about how they are *really* travelling.

The sessions are followed by online training for Club Wellbeing Teams to help facilitate a healthy and supportive community. This isn't just about young people either - for people of all ages, the local sports club may often be their closest community.

Parkside Spurs FC Wellbeing Coordinator Jo Richardson said their two sessions were highly engaging and well received.

"SALT facilitators took time to meet and understand the culture of the club. They were experienced and knowledgeable in mental health. The sessions raised awareness and highlighted the important role the football club can play in supporting players, volunteers and families.

Clubs like the Plenty Valley Masters and the Western Spurs Masters have also received this training, and they now join SALT alumni that number over 700 clubs throughout Australia via 2,500+ educational sessions across 18 different sports.

FFV is certainly proud to be supporting such an integral community endeavour.

Following the fourth instalment of the Clubs with Heart webinar series, SALT can now say they have had participation from more than 100 clubs!





Inviting philanthropy to share on-Country with First Nations organisations

Indigenous Programs

By developing strong, sustainable and supported Indigenous organisations, and by linking them with effective financial and pro-bono support, Woor-Dungin believes significant progress can be made towards tackling Indigenous disadvantage, promoting Indigenous culture and ensuring the vibrancy of Indigenous community organisations.

FFV has enabled Woor-Dungin to undertake the important work of bridging the gap between philanthropy and First Nations community-led initiatives. A Community Grant provided financial support for a series of on-Country visits involving introducing representatives of grant making bodies to a range of inspiring Aboriginal community organisations, many in rural areas, working towards advancing the health and wellbeing of their people.

In February 2023, Paula McLeod of the McLeod Family Foundation participated in an on-Country visit to Gunditimara country (Southwest Victoria), taking in WornGundidj, Gunditimara Aboriginal Cooperative, Eastern Maar Aboriginal Corporation and Kirrae Health Service. As a result of the visit, the McLeod Family Foundation made a generous donation to WornGundidj's bush nursery. Scan the QR code to watch a video about the visit and its significance.





Off the back of the connections and relationships nurtured in the course of the on-Country visits, Woor-Dungin has noted not only a dramatic increase in the numbers of First Nations partners applying for and receiving philanthropic funding, but has also drawn new members into its network of participants in a range of other initiatives, including monthly Yarning Circles, Indigenous Governance Training and Grant Writing Workshops – all key to the development of a thriving Aboriginal community sector.

"The grant we have received from Freemasons Foundation Victoria has given a huge impetus to our work with mob across Victoria," says Woor-Dungin CEO, Kirsty Sword Gusmão. "The expansion of our reach and growth to our networks has meant that we have doubled participation in our regular Yarning Circles and capacity building initiatives and boosted the interactions and shared learning amongst Aboriginal community leaders and grant making sector partners."

Impact Partnerships

We believe healthy communities are a vital cornerstone of our society.

FFV makes multi-year impact grants to substantial, meaningful projects that have the potential to make significant positive impacts to the most vulnerable Victorians.

These are a one-off grant over a specified number of years covering areas of Health / Medical Research, Education, Community Support, and Indigenous Programs.

Impact Grants:

- Cancer Council Victoria received \$250,000 the 2nd instalment of funding for the Eliminate Cervical Cancer Fund.
- Victoria Police Blue Ribbon Foundation received \$45,000 the 1st instalment of funding to support Blue Ribbon Day.
- > Let's Talk Foundation received \$100,000 - the 3rd instalment of funding for the Colac & Hamilton Hubs Community Education Program.
- Entertainment Assist Intermission received \$75,000 for their prevention based program for entertainment workers.

Let's Talk turns up the volume across South West Victoria

Let's Talk was created to break the stigma of talking about mental health. By raising awareness, encouraging help seeking and increasing community knowledge and competence in supporting people with mental illness and distress, Let's Talk benefits the whole community and aims to prevents devastating outcomes like suicide.

Research suggests that rural communities are more at risk of mental health problems, with higher rates of stigma, limited access to resources, and often isolating lifestyles.

Having supported Let's Talk Foundation with funding for signage in 2020 (in Mortlake and Warrnambool outskirts), and recognising the critical need for proactive efforts, FFV provided a \$300,000 grant over three years.

This impact grant has enabled Let's Talk to employ Community Engagement Officers for Warrnambool and Colac, implement a database for better volunteer and donor management, and engage a communications and grant specialist to support the team in writing funding applications.

Their framework emphasises Leadership, Education, Support, and Promotion, visible through initiatives like signage in sports clubs, talks with local councils, and a successful Walkathon engaging 250 participants. In 2022, a pilot program in Terang involved community leaders facilitating open conversations about mental health, crucial in a tight-knit farming community.

A recent restructure led to hiring key personnel, enhancing capacity, and planning for a formal program evaluation, speaker training, and promotional material. Let's Talk, with FFV's support, gained substantial momentum in addressing mental health issues in South West Victoria, aiming to eliminate stigma, save lives and activate communities for long-term change.

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Disaster Relief

Our Disaster Relief Fund was established in January 2020. It has been pivotal in providing emergency relief funding and ongoing support to both disaster affected Freemasons and community organisations in hard-hit areas of Victoria A key consideration in directing the funding is that it has a direct and immediate impact on those affected by disasters.

In October 2022, Victoria experienced a major flood crisis. Some towns experienced the highest river peaks in decades. The extensive impacts of this disaster prompted FFV and Freemasons Victoria to commit a combined \$700,000 toward flood relief projects across the state.


One of the key responsibilities of the Board is the monitoring of the investment activities via a robust Investment Policy with the objectives including:


- Invest in a manner that provides a level of return to fund the mission, objectives and purpose of the Foundation, its outgoings and build a legacy for the future; and
- Manage risk though prudent financial management and diversification.


